We all have an important part to play:

- please do not contact the NHS to seek a vaccine, they will contact you
- when you are contacted, please attend your booked appointments; and
- please continue to follow all the guidance to control the virus and save lives

SCAM ALERT

We are aware that some people are receiving fraudulent calls and text messages offering the COVID-19 vaccination. In some cases, people are asked to press a number on their keypad or to send a text message to confirm they wish to receive the vaccine. Doing so is likely to result in a charge being applied to their phone bill. In other cases, callers are offering the vaccine for a fee or asking for bank details.

People are warned to be alert to these scams.

The vaccine is only available from the NHS and the NHS will contact you when it is your turn. At present, appointments are only being offered to the public over 80 years old.

The NHS will:

NEVER ask you to press a button on your keypad or send a text to confirm you want the vaccine.

NEVER ask for payment or for your bank details.

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you believe you have been the victim of fraud or identity theft you should report this directly to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040. Where the victim is vulnerable, report it to Sussex Police online or by calling 101.

Rollout of a coronavirus (Covid-19) vaccine

Developed by Pfizer/BioNTech, the first vaccine has been [approved](#) for use in the UK by the [Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency](#) (MHRA).


Vaccination across Brighton and Hove began on 8th December at the Royal Sussex County Hospital, and from 15th at a limited number of GP practise.

Who will get the vaccine?

Vaccinations are being prioritised, with those most at risk of complications from COVID-19 being offered the vaccine first. The prioritisation of the vaccine follows advice from the [Joint Committee on Vaccination and Immunisation](#) (JCVI).

The priority list is shown below, with those in groups 1 and 2 currently being given the vaccine:

When more vaccine becomes available, the vaccines will be offered to other people at risk as soon as possible. Six other vaccines are in different stages of development, and it is hoped that others may also be approved for use in the near future.

How will the Covid-19 vaccine be rolled out in Brighton and Hove?

The NHS is planning to deliver the vaccination programme in three main ways:

1. Hospital Hubs (this started on 8th December)
2. Local GP-led vaccine services (this started on 15th December)
3. Vaccination Centres - large sites convenient for transport networks (not yet started)

Hospital hubs

In Sussex, the Royal Sussex County Hospital in Brighton received the first supply of the vaccine on 8th December and has begun to vaccinate those over 80, frontline NHS staff, and care worker staff.

GP-led services

On 15th December GP-led vaccination services in the community began vaccinating patients. Eight local vaccination services are now live across Sussex. Each vaccination service is being supported by one or several GP practices, with their teams working collectively to vaccinate patients at these sites. Nurses, paramedics, pharmacists, and other NHS staff will work alongside GPs to vaccinate those aged 80 and over, as well as care home workers and residents. More sites will launch over the coming weeks.

In Brighton and Hove the following four GP surgeries are supporting the vaccination programme:

- Preston Park Surgery
- Stanford Medical Centre
- The Haven Practice
- Warmdene Surgery

Please DO NOT contact your GP surgery. You will be contacted when it is your turn to receive the vaccine. More information about GP vaccinations is available [here](#).

If you have not yet been approached about having the COVID-19 vaccination, please read the information: [why you are being asked to wait](#).

When it is the right time you will receive an invitation to come forward. For most people this will be a letter, either from their GP or the national NHS. This letter will include all the information you will need to book appointments, including your NHS number.

More about the roll-out

The NHS started the first stage of the vaccine rollout in Hospital Hubs. This is mainly because the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine needs to be stored at -70 degrees Centigrade, which makes it difficult to use outside of hospital settings.

The vaccination programme will be expanding over the coming weeks and months as more vaccine becomes available. This will include:

- More hospital hubs
- More GP-led local vaccination services
- Establishing larger vaccination centres
- A roving service to take the vaccine into care homes and people's own homes if they cannot attend a vaccination site.

Why vaccination is safe and important

Three vaccines - Pfizer-BioNTech, Sputnik and Moderna - have reported good data from trials, with some suggesting 94% of over-65s could be protected from COVID-19. A further [Oxford vaccine](#) has also shown to be highly effective. The UK has access to a total of 357 million doses of vaccines from 7 different developers.

The [UK medicines regulator gave approval for first UK COVID-19 vaccine](#), developed by Pfizer/BioNTech, to be rolled out. This has been given approval for use following a thorough review carried out by the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA). Vaccines are only made available to the public after meeting strict safety and effectiveness criteria.

- Who do I advise about my frontline role (if I am not working for the NHS)?
- How will NHS bank or agency staff receive the vaccine?
- Are GP's being asked to identify those most at risk as they did with people who needed to shield?

Some of the more clinical questions you have asked us will take a little longer to answer as the NHS Clinical Commissioning Group will need to respond.
