
Who are we?

If you have an appointment but do not need to stay overnight, it means you're being treated as an outpatient.

This might be for:

- ⊕ a specialist opinion or diagnosis
- € a minor procedure
- follow-up after surgery, or
- the ongoing management of a long term condition


The numbers?

There are over 120 million outpatient attendances every year in England.

This is growing each year: 20% increase from 2021 - 2022

In Sussex there are around 1.8 million outpatient attendances every year





The Outpatient Transformation programme

Due to this increasing demand there is a national programme to transform Outpatient services

The programme aims to:

- Reduce unnecessary attendances at hospitals
- Enable GPs to get access to earlier expert advice
- Enable patients to get the care they need quickly
- Give patients more control over their own care
- Allow patients to access services in a way that suits them






